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MADDOX COMES TO TOWN Archer's economic potential as a railroad intersection was enhanced by the discovery of rich phosphate ore deposits in the surrounding areas of Hawthorne, High Springs, and Newberry. This optimal situation resulted in the influx of many people from elsewhere looking for work. One of them, William Emory ("Hitup") Maddox was an enterprising young man from Fort Valley, Georgia, who arrived in 1892 to work in the open-pit phosphate mines. This era was a time when steam-powered machinery began replacing hand labor. Thirteen years later, in 1905, he seized his opportunity and created the Maddox Foundry & Machine Works Company, strategically located in Archer and designed to make and repair mining equipment. Before long, however, the local mines closed down, thereby mandating changes in the services provided by the foundry. Beginning in 1942, for example, the foundry supported the war effort by manufacturing 88mm trench mortar shells. Today, 114 years later, the Maddox foundry remains in Archer, continuing to remain viable by being "adept at adapting" to meet ever-changing market demands. *Bill Zettler*

Bill Zettler PhD. Bill has had a life long interest in the subjects of biology and history. A native of Pennsylvania, he was a faculty member for 37 years at the University's College of Agriculture before retiring in 2003, and has continued to teach on an ad hoc basis ever since then. One of his most popular courses was "Bio-history: Plants, Plagues, and People". He is also the author of the book, "The Bio-history of Alachua County, Florida." He and his wife, Carol, continue to live near Archer itself rich in both biology and history.

A Brief History of Archer's **Depot's**

Did you know that there were four depots located in Archer.?

The one still standing was constructed in 1893. It is the second depot and houses the Archer Historical Society Museum. It was originally a freight depot that later in 1907 was raised and enlarged around the exterior with a deck for passengers and freight.

The first Depot however was constructed in 1860. It was located west of town.

Another depot (Union Station) and tracks were built further east in 1914.

Archer had two depots in operation until 1900, when the first depot was torn down.

The Archer Historical Society has played a major role in the restoration of the remaining Depot. It was donated by the Seaboard railroad in 1978 and the society leased the land it was on.

In 1983 because of success in raising money through yearly fairs and events, the Society approached the railroad with an offer to purchase the land.

In 1987 again money was raised this time for the painting of the exterior of the building.

Today again through events, and donations, money was raised to have some restoration of the exterior and add a much needed exterior coat of paint.

The railroad played a major role for the growth and success of Archer. Visit the museum and learn the fascinating history of Archer and its railroad.
