Because of monies used for the repair of the Depot roof **\$4000**, the restoration of the depot's ticket office floor had to be delaved.



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Voter Fraud, Archer and the Election of 1876

Archer gained some notoriety during the presidential election of 1876, one of the most contentious ones in U.S. history. This election presaged the end of Reconstruction Era in 1877 whereby the Democrats conceded the election to the Republican Rutherford B. Hayes in return for an end to Reconstruction and the withdrawal of federal troops from the South. (In Florida, most Blacks and many White expatriates from the north were Republicans whereas most southern Whites were registered Democrats.)

The election in Florida was especially close. Despite winning only 50.1% of the popular vote,

Hayes was able to garner all four of this state's electoral college votes (Florida currently has 29 votes). That narrow margin of victory in Florida proved all the more critical given that Hayes managed to win the nation's electoral college results by only a single point, i.e. 185-184. Not surprisingly, allegations of election fraud were rampant on both sides during the election campaign of 1876, especially in Florida.

With a relatively high population of Blacks in 1876, Alachua County leaned Republican (1,984 for Hayes and 1,267 for his Democratic rival). However, these results were viewed askance by Democrats who claimed many ballot boxes were stuffed with illegal Republican ones. Particularly suspicious in

this regard were the 219 ballots found in Archer precinct's box No. 2.

According to local historian Rance Braley (1990) "Democrats declared that Archer's returns were invalid because of illegal procedures. They charged that blank ballots had been signed by voters which were then filled in with the Republican's name by two precinct officials in a back room of the polling place and then substituted for the ballots in the box." However, an investigative committee consisting of six Democrats and seven Republicans decided that proof of

election fraud was lacking. This questionable verdict led to the sardonic local quip, "six won't beat seven."

Republican Leonard G. Dennis, a native of Massachusetts and former member of the Union Army during the war was implicated in this scandal. He became a prominent politician, residing in Gainesville and becoming wealthy as a "political boss" by doing favors on behalf of his party. At first the "Little Giant" denied any role in the Archer affair but had to confess otherwise after the Democrats took control of the House of Representatives in 1878.


